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
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

State finances are in shambles. Every single State's, without exception, though the degree may vary. The COVID-19-induced lockdown has dealt State finances a **triple whammy**. Their own revenue sources — mainly from liquor sales, stamp duty from property transactions and sales tax on petroleum products — that account for half their total revenues, have collapsed. And their expenditure such as on interest payments. social sector schemes and staff salary remains unchanged. Worse, they are now called upon to on **beefing** spend more up their health infrastructure and on COVID-19 measures, including testing, treatment and quarantining. So, it is not surprising that all of them, (A) inducting the gold standard ones such as Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu and Karnataka, are now pleading for funding support from the Centre and relaxation in borrowing rules by the RBI. And the Centre has been watching silently even as some States have gone ahead and cut salaries of their employees and pension benefits to rein in expenses.

It could be argued that by seeking consecutive extensions of the lockdown, which imposes tremendous strain on not just their finances but also that of the Centre, the States are wrong in their approach. Are they taking the easy option by seeking extensions and simultaneously demanding financial support from the Centre? Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Maharashtra, in

their desperation, commenced liquor sales with outlets flouting all physical distancing norms. The fear is that this could seed fresh infections. The Centre is itself not in a happy place financially. But it at least has the means to replenish its finances through conventional and unconventional means. For instance. appropriated almost all of the benefit of falling oil prices through increase in duties — Rs.13 a litre on petrol and Rs.16 a litre on diesel - in two tranches in March and again, last week. It recently announced an increase in its borrowing by half for this fiscal. The burden is on the Centre to find the resources to immediately release the dues of the States and also reimburse them for their COVID-19-related expenses. It should seriously consider relaxing the fiscal deficit levels of the States from the current 3% level to at least 4.5%, just as it should relax its own level too. The States should at least be able to borrow more. The Centre should also give States the freedom to restart economic activity based on their own assessment. Not all States are in the same virus-spread position and within each State, not all districts are the same. This has to be acknowledged while planning a phased lifting of the lockdown. Greater leeway in restarting economic activity will relieve some of the financial stress, not just on the States but also on the Centre.

Heading the HR function of the Railways, I had public representatives of different political (A) persuasions make routine visits to my office. life and emerge from the dusty ravines of Chambal to finally arrive in Lutyens Delhi.

Cut back to another meeting a few months earlier, again with an honourable public representative, but this time with a "respectable" background. He walked in and without much preamble wanted to know why a certain recruitment for the Railways in his constituency was done without giving preference to the locals. On my explaining to him that his demand was against the rules, he left my chamber in a huff threatening me with dire consequences.

Both were "honourable" MPs. But while the criminal history of one was an open book and she carried the burden of her past till the very end (Phoolan Devi was shot dead a few months later outside her official residence in New Delhi, perhaps a retribution for the infamous Behmai massacre of the 1980s), the other moved around as a respectable leader, his inherent criminality and corruption ----- from the public by the veneer of his official position. Who "honourable"? was more Since "honourable" is not necessarily honourable, it is perhaps time to consign this meaningless symbolism to the dustbin of history. Unless, of course, the honourables themselves need a constant reminder that they had better behave honourably, always.

In an election rally, West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee had contrasting messages for the two major religious communities of the state. She appealed to Hindus not to vote on religious grounds, on the basis of "Hindu-Mussalman", and fall for the BharatiyaJanata Party (BJP)'s attempt to divide people on religious lines. She appealed to Muslims that they must not let minority votes get divided, warned them not to fall for the (1) **rhythm** of Abbas Siddiqui (who is a

part of the Left-Congress alliance), and warned the community that it would face the "biggest danger" if the BJP came to power.

This message, in a way, sums up all that is wrong with the politics of (2) secularism in India. Ms Banerjee clearly did not see a contradiction in asking Hindus not to vote as Hindus, and asking Muslims to vote as Muslims in a (3) commodity manner. It was in tune with her party's strategy of winning a majority of the minority votes and a minority of the majority votes. But this undermines secularism, just as the BJP's attempt to win a majority of the majority votes by (4) shocking their anxieties, and constructing Muslims as the "other" undermines secularism. In fact, by pointing to attempts to consolidate the minority vote, the BJP is often able to stir up Hindu political consciousness across caste lines.

#### **Answer With Explanation**

#### 1) Answer: D
